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INTRODUCTION

This bibliography, revised and annotated, was prepared by Miss Anita M. Proffitt of the U. S. Air Force Academy Library staff. Since the falcon is the mascot of the United States Air Force Academy, an attempt has been made to build up a collection on the subject of falconry. The Academy Library now has a large and comprehensive collection of material on this subject.

Because many of the items in the falconry collection are rare and valuable editions, they are housed in the Special Collection Branch of the Library. The remainder, however, are in the general collection.

The Academy Library also publishes an illustrated brochure on the subject of historical falconry with emphasis on cadet participation in the sport. The brochure is available upon request from the Director of the Academy Library, U. S. Air Force Academy, Colorado 80840.

A reprint of the seventh part of La Fauconnerie with some excellent notes by the editor. The conference lasted 16 days and many aspects of the art were discussed.

Audubon, John James. Audubon folio. New York: Harry M. Abrams Inc., 1964. (QL 674 A91a)

A biography of Audubon and biographical sketch of each of the 30 birds represented by the 30 large color plates. 2 large color plates of falcons.

_____. Audubon's birds of America, with a foreword and descriptive captions by William Vogt. New York: Macmillan, 1937, 1953. (QL 674 A91)

Audubon's beautiful color paintings are included. The descriptive captions with each painting are more detailed than in the popular edition. Includes sections on the birds of prey.

_____. Audubon's birds of America. Pop. ed. New York: Macmillan, 1950. (QL 674 A91 1950)

Book is chiefly concerned with Audubon as an artist and ornithologist. Brief captions are given with each of Audubon's beautiful color paintings. Includes sections on kites, hawks, ospreys and falcons.

Austin, Oliver L., Jr. Birds of the world; a survey of the twenty-seven orders and one hundred and fifty-five families. New York: Golden Press, 1961. (QL 673 A93)

A comprehensive survey of the world's birds showing the birds as they are, a natural living entity. Sections on birds of prey are included. (Color pictures.)

Austing, G. Ronald. I went to the woods: the autobiography of a bird photographer. London: Hutchinson, 1963. (TR 710 A93)

The joys, the care and time and patience needed, the problems encountered in order to obtain pictures are related. Tales of catching the various birds are told. Numerous pictures and accounts of hawks and falcons are included.

_____. World of the red-tailed hawk. Philadelphia: Lippincott, 1964. (QL 696 .A2 A93)

Describes the red-tailed hawk and its life through all four seasons.

Ornithological work based on the field experiences of many outstanding naturalists and upon their valuable collections of specimens accumulated through the years., Sections are devoted to the birds of prey found in Colorado,

Baird, Spencer F. Birds of North America, the descriptions of species based chiefly on the collections in the Smithsonian Institution. Philadelphia: Lippincott, 1860. (QL 681 B16)

To give accurate and easily recognized figures of numerous hitherto unknown birds. Contains figures of all birds in U.S. not given by former American authors. Done to continue and conclude to time of writing a pictorial representation of all North American birds. Includes birds of prey. (Color plates)

Barber, Robert Heberden. A supplementary bibliography of hawking, being a catalogue of books published in England between 1891 and 1943 together with criticism, to which is added a list of the most important books published prior to that period. London: Fielding, 1943. (SK 321 B23)

Beebe, Frank L. North American falconry and hunting hawks. Denver: North American Falconry and Hunting Hawks, 1964. (SK 321 B41)

An original manuscript. Nothing reprinted. Authoritative up-to-date information. Gives a step-by-step approach to technical problems.

Belany, James Cockburn. A treatise upon falconry. Berwick-upon-Tweed: 1841. (SK 321 B42)

A brief outline of the character and habits of the different hawks principally used in British hawking, with proper instructions for keeping, training, and flying the birds.

Bent, Arthur C. Life histories of North American birds of prey.
2 vols. New York: Dover Publications, 1961. (QL 696
.A2 B47)

One of a series of bulletins on the life history of North American birds.

Berners, Juliana. The boke of Saint Albans. London: E. Stock,
1881. (SK 321 B52)

Reproduced in facsimile from the original printed in 1486. Contains treatises on hawking, hunting, and cote armour.

Bert, Edmund. An approved treatise of hawkes and hawking.
Diuided into three Bookes. The first teacheth, How to make a short-winged hawke good... The second, How to reclaime a hawke from any ill condition. The third, teacheth Cures for all knowne griefes and diseases ... London, Printed by Thomas J. Snodham, for Richard Moore ... 1619. (SK 321 B53 1619)

Little is known of the author Edmund Bert beyond the fact that he lived near Romford and was advanced in years before he published his Treatise. In his introduction to the reprint (1891), the late Mr. J. E. Harting wrote "Of the three treatises by our old English masters of falconry, Turbervile, Latham, and Bert, that of Bert at the present time is unquestionably the scarcest .. From certain statements of the author, it would seem to have been printed to oblige his friends, and was not intended for general circulation ... the fact remains that, at the present time the work is practically unprocurable; and this is the more to be regretted, because having been composed by an English falconer of great experience, it is still of utility and value to those who at the present day would keep hawks and fly them at game."

The author's experiences form the basis of this work on hawks, their training and care. A glossary of technical terms is included.

Includes a history of falconry. Presents a study of the art and practice of falconry: how to obtain the young birds, their care and training.
- Bř, Olav. Falcon catching in Norway, with emphasis on the post reformation period. Translated by Shelby Thompson. Oslo: Universitetsforlaget, 1962. (SK 321 B66)
A description of falcon catching in Norway in the post reformation period with special emphasis on the ethnologic and folkloristic aspects.
- Boyer, Abel. Traité de fauconnerie et autourserie. Paris: Payot, 1948. (SK 321 B79)
A modern French work on the art of falconry. Contains drawings and photographs.
- Braess, Martin. Die Raubvogel als Naturdenkmäler. Berlin: Gebrüder Borntraeger, 1913. (QL 696 .A2 B81)
Discusses the importance of birds of prey, economically, to science and to the world of learning. Also discusses the disappearance of birds of prey and laws affecting them.

Consists of six large, beautifully colored plates with descriptive text. Plates are life size.

The exciting story of how a miracle of conservation was brought about and at what hazards.

A detailed study of hunting with special attention to falconry. Includes history, techniques, special terminology, and rules and laws governing the sport,

Includes section on falcons and hawks.

Written by a past master in the art of handling all hawks, but especially the passage peregrine, Details of the lore of falconry,

A treatise giving best directions for hunting and killing all manner of chases used in England, with terms of the art, Special. section on fowling and one on hawks.

Craighead, Frank Cooper, and Craighead, John Johnson. Hawks in the hand; adventures in photography and falconry. Boston: Houghton Mifflin, 1939. (SK 321 C88)

Describes the adventures of two American boys who made a hobby of training and photographing hawks.

Craighead, John Johnson, and Craighead, Frank C. Hawks, owls and wildlife. Harrisburg, Pa.: Stackpole, 1956. (QL 696 .A2 C88)

Undertakes to answer questions on the dynamics and ecology of raptors, the relationship between predators and prey. Hawks and owls are still persecuted for depredations against game birds and poultry but it is known now this is the work of a limited number of species.

A treatise on goshawks, falcons, sparrow hawks, merlins, their types and characteristics and how to care for them.

A study of the hunting habits and methods of different raptors in catching their prey.

A publication covering hawking activities in Germany for years indicated.

Ehon Taka Kagami. Picture books on Falconry in Japanese. 5 vols. (SK 321 E33)

Profusely and graphically illustrated. A comparatively modern work.

Evans, Arthur Humble. Birds. Reprint ed. New York: Hafner Pub. Co., 1959. (Cambridge Natural History.. . . Vol IX.) (QL 45 C17)

A short description of the majority of the forms in many of the bird families. A brief description of the structure and habits of each group is given. Includes the birds of prey.

Fisher, Albert K. The hawks and owls of the United States in their relation to agriculture. U. S. Department of Agriculture. Division of Ornithology and Mamalogy. Bulletin 3. Washington, D. C.: Government Printing Office, 1893. (QL 696 .A2 F53)

This bulletin is intended to be a practical benefit to the farmer. Descriptions are given of all birds of prey so that the farmer may tell his friends from his foes and preserve the first and destroy the latter.

Fisher, Charles Hawkins. Reminiscences of a falconer. London: John C. Nimmo, 1901. (SK 321 F53)

A personal narrative of falconry in the nineteenth century.

Fleming, John Arnold, Falconry and falcons. London: Country Life, 1934. (SK 321 F59)

An account of the hawk and its training for sport, with some excellent **photographs** of the birds in natural setting.

A practical text on the care of the birds and their use in hunting.

Freeman, Gage Earle, and Salvin, Francis Henry, Falconry, its claims, history and practice... London: Longmans, Green, 1859. (SK 321 F85f)

A rare book by practical falconers. A comprehensive discussion on the training and management of falcons.

A reprint of Wood's translation of De arte venandi cum avibus.

Once a means of supplying man's necessities it has survived the centuries as one of the most romantic pastimes in history. Covers training of falcons.

Glasier, Philip. As the falcon her bells. New York: Dutton, 1964. (SK 321 G54)

Bookbyamaster craftsman about his craft, The author's own story of his involvement with all living creatures and his enduring devotion to falconry.

Grossman, Mary Louise, and Hamlet, John. Birds of prey of the world. New York: C. N. Potter, 1964. (QL 696 G87)

Most complete, authoritative book on the world's birds of prey. Result of years of travel, work, study and collection. Covers everything concerning birds of prey.

A concise history of the life of birds, One section is devoted to the family of falcons. It deals with the various members of this bird family, their habits, the art of falconry and its importance in the Middle Ages. Also includes material on hunting of falcons.
